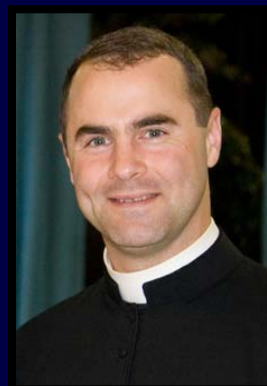
# THE DEATH OF ADAM & THE BIRTH OF CHRIST UNDERSTANDING THE NATIVITY OF GOD
